FROM THE SENIOR MINISTER

Most of the book of Deuteronomy is stuff Moses said before leaving the people he had led for 40 years. I have not led you that long, but fifteen years is not a short time. Thus, like Moses, I would like to use these brief monthly messages to note four principles I live by as a clergyman. Look for these qualities in my successor. They, as much as any skill or gift, will assure you that person will serve you well.

1. Transparency.

In a spiritual democracy, like ours, authority is delegated from the congregation to its leaders. To succeed, those leaders need to share as much as they can to retain the trust and support of the congregation. Of course there are matters that must be held in confidence, and information that cannot be published. Most things, though, can be shared. I believe that your spiritual leader needs to model maximum transparency. As we live in times when elected leaders often conceal their stake and motives, it is doubly important now for those in authority to demonstrate transparency.

Often I have shared my weaknesses and struggles in the pulpit, not to gain sympathy, but to show that being more vulnerable is healthier than trying to hide. When I was a political candidate, I had to list all my financial assets publicly, to assure I was not working for my own benefit. That is not necessary for a clergyperson, but I have shared my pledge and that it is a tithe.

Transparency builds trust. In these polarized and suspicious times we need those - people and institutions - that dare to trust each other. I have heard the management is doing things right, and leadership is doing the right thing. Faith, that essential religious word, literally means trust.

Choose someone who will be transparent with you, and who has faith in you as well as in themselves. -WFW-

As an example of Transparency, let me tell you that the extra music this year has been paid for out of several sources. Several members contributed (somewhat more than \$1500). The annual Music budget (not for staff but for extra music) and the Gilson Fund also contributed, (somewhat more than \$3000) and finally my own Discretionary Fund (about \$9000). The Discretionary Fund comes from honoraria I receive for weddings and memorials, contributions, and any residual money from my annual expense account after being reimbursed. It's only used for extra, non-budgeted expenses. For example, it has paid a staffer's health insurance to bridge the gap after leaving, use of the building for groups that could not afford it, and some sabbatical costs from my pilgrimages. You may still contribute to help pay for our guest musicians. Any residual money will go toward my next pilgrimage to Via Francigena (www.viefrancigene.org/en/)

This title refers to a wicked song in the form of fiery tango dance from Argentina. The Perugino String Quartet will perform three different examples, from tender to testy.

"Whose Music Is It Anyhow?" | Rev. Dr. Fred Wooden

WFW will speak on this as the Perugino String Quartet returns to play Haydn's "Emperor," whose middle movement is both sublime and troubling. Some thoughts on what happens when music is abused.

When I came to Fountain Street Church in 2018, I was told "there are two things you need to know: next year will be our 150th Year of Ministry and with that comes a lot of special programming and events, and after that our Senior Minister will be retiring."

With one half of this behind us, we now look ahead to our Senior Minister, Fred Wooden's departure in April. With you, I share a robust mix of nervousness, eagerness, and wonder when I think about the coming transition, and I find myself even more curious about what the future holds for our community of beloved Fountain Streeters, regardless of who we have identified as our Senior Minister at any given time in the narrative you and I are writing together.

Now I know I have said this before but it feels worth repeating: This is an invitation.

Any time the cards are reshuffled and a new chapter begins for a congregation, there is an invitation for all of us to be our best selves and to liver bigger and love broader in into a discussion about the need for ways that we never imagined that we could. Just like our 150th year gave us all pause to consider our past and imagine our future, this transition year is a big, giant, and beautiful invitation for us to step back and look at our congregation and the ways in which we experience it as our chosen community.

In this new year, I resolve, and invite you to resolve, a renewed commitment to all of you. I want to know each of you better and for you to know one another even better than that! I want for us to be intentional about meeting "new" people in our very midst and learning about "old" people we've "known" for years, but never truly known.

To do this, I'm inviting you to spend January

through March living intentionally with me through a variety of events, groups, and gatherings that are curated specifically to help us understand the importance of being in community, the importance of our particular community, and the importance of our place within it. While participation in this is not required for a fully satisfying and authentic sense of belonging here at FSC, I know that for myself I am eager to possess a more refined understanding of why FSC is so important to me and why it is so important for me to go deeper, for such a time as this in our story.


COME SING WITH US!


He was Artist in Residence at the Byron Center Fine Arts Center in 2018 and the Forest Hills Fine Arts Center in 2019.








Support the Church, Reduce Your Tax Bill

If you are age 70 1/2 or older and have an Individual Retirement Account (IRA), you may qualify for a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD). Once a person turns age 70 1/2, the IRS requires a minimum amount be withdrawn from their IRA each year -this Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) is taxable as ordinary income. However, eligible charitably-minded members and friends of FSC may elect to have all or a portion of their RMD sent directly to FSC (as an annual pledge to support ongoing operations or to support the Fountain Street Foundation). This direct charitable contribution from your IRA to the Church or any other charitable cause may lead to reduced taxes. Connections Returns for Winter 2020

Leading by Heart: re-discovering your courage at Fountain Street Church

For the past two years, Connections Circles have been meeting for 4-week sessions around the theme of "Change" - examining our fears and resistance to change as well as our strategies for whole-heartedly embracing change. This Winter, as we head into yet another transition phase with new church leadership on the horizon, we offer two sets of 4-week Connections series with a particular focus on leadership.

Using Brene Brown's book, Dare to Lead we will:

- discover, explore and re-define what makes a good leader
- discover our own leadership qualities in a Connections setting
- discover another way to be intentional in community

What is Connections? Intentional small groups of 6 to 8 people who meet to experience a new way of speaking and listening to each other, creating the time and space for deeper and better conversation.

As part of the Learning Commons, the "Leading by Heart" sessions will be offered on Sunday mornings from 10:45 to 12:30 and on Tuesday mornings from 9:30 to 11:00 on the following dates:

- Session One: Sundays Feb 2, 9, 16, 23 and again on March 1, 8, 15, 22.
